This it seems was the case with the Oro Hondo Mine.



The Oro Hondo Saga

Today the community's only reminder of the Oro Hondo's existence is the droning whirl of the exhaust fan now situated over its old shaft. Back in 1914, the mine was

the big dream of John T. Milliken. Begun in 1903, it had already been in several hands when he gained control. He extended the shaft to a depth of 2,300 feet and explored for a gold ore body he was convinced was there, but others had missed. However, World War I and other circumstances combined to bring his big dream to an end without ever finding that significant ore body. It would not be until years later when the mine was under the control of Homestake Mining Company that it would be discovered that his drilling came just 100 feet short of the Main Ledge which would have propelled it to becoming a Homestake-level legendary mine of its own.
